"Scholarship, Pedagogy, and the Creative Process"

In teaching the fine and performing arts, real-time and immersive learning engages students in "arts practice": that is, in the processes, techniques, skills, data-sets, and critical perspectives whose combination in real time yields the art object or experience. Makers and learners can be engaged in both creating this object or experience, and then reporting, in a critical and analytical fashion, upon the considerations that went into its creation, thereby "opening out" the collaborative process for investigation and dialogue. Transdisciplinary and multi-modal in both philosophy and practice, this synthesis of creativity activity and critical analysis, as "**Arts Practice Research**," is a fast-growing topic within university curricula, both here in North America and abroad. Programs may differ in their language and definitions, but they uniformly share a fundamental conviction that both the *creation* and the *analysis* of an arts object (physical or processual) can be constituent elements of the scholarly mission, uniting the creator and the critic as "practitioner".

Because the arts reach out to students, the community, the academy, the gallery, technology, other disciplines, the environment, history, social justice, entertainment, and transnational communities, in furthering art's reach, we who engage in Arts Practice can expand and diversify the impact of our research and art-making. Arts practice is thus precisely the place in which Fine & Performing Arts faculty can unite research, teaching, and creative activity. Texas Tech University's College of Visual and Performing Arts has been a leader in arts practice research for four decades, since the foundation of the CVPA's interdisciplinary PhD in Fine Arts.

Giving Voice to the Female Hero

Abstract : In order for women to be recognized as heroic, women heroes have to be remembered. This talk will explore how female heroes are placed in a visual narrative of heroes. Contextualizing their lives provides a framework to understand the hero in relation to gender. As an artist, House explores the tension between heroic archetypes and gender. Her most recent series of largescale paintings, RE•WESTERN, places contemporary women into heroic roles played by movie icons such as John Wayne. By flipping the gender, and retaining the same visual signifiers, the series conveys female heroes and speaks to women's access to power.

An overview of wandering will be provided by the chair, after which the authors will examine different concepts and applications of wandering, such as the Surrealist activation of memory through a wandering chronotope, *flânerie* in performance composition, and poetic nonrepresentational place-making in visual art. Arts practice research has developed at the crossroads between artistic process and its self-reflexive analysis. PANEL ABSTRACT: We three dance artists/practitioners, while reflecting on and "opening out" our work together over time, arrived at three emergent acts/actions/ activities that have reappeared, developed, and, over time, influenced our praxis. They are shaking, touching, and queering. They are methods, values, descriptors, and inroads to each other. This solo was created by "folding [shaking, touching, and queering] back into" the dancemaking process using questions inspired by Robin Nelson's **Practice-as-Research** (PaR) model: 1. What is it? How do you do it? 2. What does it do? To you? To the world? 3. How might it change you? How might it change the world?

Creating Arts Infrastructure/Developing Artist Research

Our session will feature a panel of artists who have developed infrastructure for the making, exhibiting, or understanding of art. Schwabsky writes: "... 'painterliness' has a different value today than it did in the past (...) allowing the painting to linger in the condition in which things are still unsettled, metamorphic, in transition" (About Painting, 2011). REMEMBERING PAUL HANNA

Paul Hanna was a committed art faculty member. During our time on the TTU faculty I saw Paul begin a variety of interesting initiatives for students in the art program. Primary among them was the *Experimental Art Class*, which included elements of site specific, installation, performance and kinetic art forms. The purpose of the class was rather ahead of its time in a college art curriculum of the 1970s.

As well, Paul was instrumental in the conception and production of a national glass art conference held at TTU. He was also responsible for several recruiting initiatives including a statewide drawing competition for high school seniors. The awards took the form of scholarships to the TTU art program.

In addition, Paul Hanna was for a number of years the TTU representative to TASA. He was instrumental in promoting the common foundations core created by TASA, to serve students of all two and four year college art programs. Obtaining support for the common core concept was no small undertaking but Paul was tenacious in making sure everyone embraced the policy. The existence and acceptance of the common core seems so obvious to us today however, this was not the case in the early days of TASA. Thank you Paul, we owe you for this one!

Paul Hanna was an interesting person. Collector of old-time radio shows, driver of sports cars and pickup trucks. I will miss our long-time argument about whether it is possible to teach creativity or not.

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


